REMEMBERING DODY

For as long as I've been a part of Region 15, Dody O'Brien has been my one constant. So it was with a certain amount of dread that I packed for regional contest this year, aware our spritely behind-the-scenes magician wouldn't be there to cast her spell.

But even though Dody wasn't at the microphone, standing on a box to peek above the podium, it quickly became apparent she was everywhere: Her knowledge lives on within the talented members of Region 15's Regional Management Team, the Regional Convention Committee—and the many volunteers that make such an annual undertaking possible.

"Everything was easy with Dody," says Greater Nassau Chorus member Sue Tietjen, who as a former regent and regional board member spent many hours conferring with the former FBI administrator. When on occasion the team's best-laid plans went awry, Sue says she often turned to one of Dody's philosophies for strength: "No matter what happens, you can laugh afterwards."

Dody, who would have been 71 in September, joined Sweet Adelines in 1966, singing with the Staten Island Chapter. Within six months, she was the chapter's vice president. From there, she became involved with the Executive Committee, which later became the Board of Directors and, more recently, morphed into the Regional Management Team. Along the way, Dody was Competition Coordinator, Official Panel Liaison, TAGLINES Editor and regional historian. Her last "official" title was Events Coordinator.

Greater Nassau Chorus Master Director and Education Coordinator Harriette Walters, who shared many a long drive with Dody to and from regional meetings, says Dody dedicated herself body and soul to her many regional activities: "She could talk about anything and remembered everything."

Dody's longtime friend Cathy Bucholtz, who (like many Region 15 leaders) was pulled into the thick of things by Dody and was her assistant as Events Coordinator, remembers the Brooklyn native as a supportive leader who stood her ground. Dody also was a good sport. Cathy recalls an International Education Symposium (IES) in San Antonio, when the team decided to sight-see. They piled into the mini-van, only to discover there was no space for Dody to sit. Solution: Have her lie down across the laps in the back seat. "We had to pack Dody like luggage," Cathy laughs.

THE INTERNATIONAL IMPACT

Our International contest was re-routed to Detroit last fall after it became obvious the city of New Orleans was under water. Within three weeks, International headquarters had a magnificent contest rescheduled and what a contest it was! Region 15's quartet, Escape, wowed all of us with their dynamic sound. They looked and sounded beautiful, placing 32 out of 47 quartets, and made all of us proud.

Region 15 was blessed twice in the chorus competition by having both our regional winner, Ramapo Valley Chorus, and our wild card winner, Greater Nassau Chorus, as contestants. It was such a thrill for those of us in the audience to see our friends on that International stage. Both choruses did a fabulous job representing our region. Ramapo Valley placed 16th out of 33 choruses and Greater Nassau placed 10th, giving them the honor of singing their entertainment package. Greater Nassau also won the prestigious International Harmony Achievement Award for being the highest-scoring midsize chorus.

Our Region 15 competitors were magnificent, and we thank you for making our region so proud to say

you are part of our family...Now we will hear from first-time International competitors: "Adrenalinefilled, wide-eyed, overwhelmed, excited, experience of a lifetime." These are some of the many words and phrases you'll hear if you speak with any competitor who has competed on the International stage with Sweet Adelines. Can you imagine the experience of competing at International AND being a new member of Sweet Adelines, too?

We asked one member from Greater Nassau and one from Ramapo Valley, who fit in the "new" category, to share their experiences at the recent competition in Detroit last October.

From the time we arrived, I was enamored with the experience. I proudly wore my All Events badge

with the "Definitely Diva" and "First Timer" ribbons stuck to its sides. For the eight hours following our performance at the Semi-Finals, our chorus sat together in anticipation, still unsure of how well we did compared to the many other talented choruses we saw perform. During breaks, I spent time with different members of our chorus—a special opportunity for me as a newer member. We talked, wandered around, made each other laugh, traded stories about how we joined Greater Nassau and began to connect. There was something about being there all day, listening to amazing barbershop music, and just being together that felt like the ultimate bonding experience. Before we knew it, evening rolled around, and the results were being announced. We held hands, crossed our fingers and prayed together, hoping for the best. When we were presented with the Harmony Achievement Award and informed of our Top 10 finish, there was wild, electric, joyful mayhem in the Greater Nassau block unlike anything I had ever experienced: jumping, screaming, laughing, embracing anyone and everyone. We were brimming with pride in ourselves, our hard work and our accomplishment—and the celebration continued late into the night.

Amidst our hugging and cheering, we understood that our job in Detroit was not finished: More long rehearsals were ahead to prepare for the Finals on Saturday, and it was still too early to guess how we would rank in the end. But by getting the chance to find my place among the love, connectedness, and energy that was at the heart of Greater Nassau, I knew I had already won.

EDITOR'S NOTE: TAGLINES Editor Heather Collins interviewed the directors of regional medalists Greater Nassau and Liberty Oak about their competition philosophy.

GREATER NASSAV

With their win this April in Philadelphia, the 72 members onstage with Greater Nassau turned a corner, moving clearly into that elusive "A" level.

For Master Director Harriette Walters—or "just Harriette" as Island Hills Director Scott Brannon joked during the Show of Champions that weekend—the victory can be pinned to two key factors, trust and teamwork. "They just want to do it. They are flying in the same formation," she says shortly before postcontest rehearsal one Tuesday in mid-April.

That connection was forged and strengthened last fall in Detroit at International Competition with

GNC's 10th Place finish and Harmony Achievement recognition. The energy endured and drove rehearsals in the months following the Detroit experience and leading into regional contest. During those sessions, individual members were encouraged to work at home and to seek additional help appropriate to their skill level. Harriette's goal: To drill "infallible" technique off-stage so it became instinctive in performance. That way, she can concentrate on drawing out the message and emotion of the song.

For outside ears, Harriette turned to coaches including Pride of Baltimore Director Janet Ashford and Melodeers Director Jim Arns as well as vocal expression and sound expert Michael Hayden and the legendary Betty Clipman.

During the April rehearsal, she drills vowel matching as a warm-up and stops the chorus frequently, urging different sections to listen and provide feedback and reminding the group that they should "perform" even this technical exercise. As they begin running repertoire, the interruptions continue as Harriette calls on riser personnel to explain the reason she has stopped and then asks them for the potential remedy. When the chorus finally has the chance to sing a number through from edge to edge they dive in willingly and the wall of sound overwhelms guests sitting on the sidelines.

That sound has defined GNC's personality for some time, but this regional contest brought a less technical expression. The brand-new ballad the chorus took onstage is a perfect case in point, showcasing a freedom that contributed to their new level.

Harriette says, "Everything that happened on stage was not planned. ... But I said we could go in the emotion together, and they all went."

We're sure glad they did.

LIBERTY OAK

Liberty Oak Director Katie Pinto leaves very little to chance.

She attributes a disciplined regimen of vocal "encouragement" established by the chorus' board and music team—a regimen adhered to religiously over the past year—as the winning formula for Liberty Oak's achievement of this year's Most Improved Chorus for Region 15. Liberty Oak's leap of 127 points in score was the largest margin of improvement among ALL regions granting a Most Improved award this spring. It didn't take a huge increase in Liberty Oak's music budget to achieve this. Just focus and commitment. "They always know what they're going to be working on," Katie says.

Schedules for each rehearsal are distributed to the chorus' approximately 40 members in advance and notes from the previous week are transcribed and distributed by a diligent chorus member, Sandy Robinson. A half-hour of each session is devoted to vocal skills development, and the existing library of learning tapes and CDs was overhauled in favor of tools from learning trackers from men's barbershoppers Tim Waurick and Tony DeRosa. Members are encouraged to be off paper with new songs within three to four weeks.

For this contest season, Liberty Oak was focused on improving its vocal and physical performing skills through a regimen of weekly and some extra section rehearsals. Katie also had hoped for "B" level scores and the Most Improved distinction at contest. Looking forward, the chorus hopes to develop more chorus unity through a quartet program, more performances and education about music theory, and the role of the various judging categories.

Katie thinks her perspective as a performing member of Millstone Valley and as lead of the Quest quartet has been invaluable for finding new ways to approach education and direction. For one thing, she's been able to bring a performer's knowledge to music selection. "Choruses have a personality just like a quartet does," she says.

For Liberty Oak, this has translated into a new freedom and confidence when it comes to performing, something its six new members are learning from the get-go. It's worth noting that Katie stepped out of her front-and-center directing position for much of Liberty Oak's contest uptune onstage in April, demonstrating the strong rapport she has with the chorus.

For next April, Liberty Oak is determined to maintain its B level stature and hopes to remain in the medals. Aside from Katie's and the music team's rigorous regimen, the chorus plans to work with Greater Nassau's Harriette Walters, Ramapo Valley's Sharon Vitkovsky, Millstone Valley's Jack Pinto and Gale Jencik, director of Rhode Islands' Coastline Show Chapter, which just captured Region 1 blue ribbon with a score of 662.

Round The Region BROOKLYN

Since we returned from competition, Brooklyn Chorus has been busy preparing for the wedding of our former director, Mindy Fliegelman, to Carl Jacobsen on May 20. Mindy is now a very active singing member of Brooklyn Chorus, lending her voice to the Lead or Bari sections (and even to Bass and Tenor on occasion, if needed). We were all invited to sing at the wedding ceremony and the reception, so we have been learning new music and brushing up on old favorites, such as "My Romance."

On April 22, most of the chorus traveled to Manhattan to attend Mindy's bridal shower given by her friend Joyce at the Selis Manor. The chorus also surprised Mindy at rehearsal with our own mini bridal shower, complete with a champagne toast by our Director Mary Ruffin, and both humorous and sentimental gifts. A visit from "Zelda" and, of course, lots of snacks and sweets made the evening fun.

May 21 found Brooklyn Chorus at the waterfront to sing for the annual Bay Fest in Sheepshead Bay. We have performed for many years at this all-day festival of music, arts and crafts, and a health fair. One highlight of the day is the Blessing of the Fleet of the fishing, sightseeing and pleasure boats in Brooklyn Bay.


We've got big plans for this summer, and to start everything off on the right foot we did our annual outdoor performance at the Ridgewood Bandshell in June.

With tears in her eyes, Elva says, "This is one of my strongest memories. I will never forget it."

That sums up what membership in Song of the Valley and Sweet Adelines means to one who has given her heart to singing and performing.

Quartet Corner

ESCAPE

By now, you probably know that Region 15's 2006 champion quartet Escape coined its name in homage to the refuge that quartet singing offers this foursome from their gaggle of young children (and grandchildren!) Watch out Vegas, these ladies need some family-free time.

But what you might not remember is that the original foursome formed in May 1998 placed near the bottom of the heap in their first quartet contest seven years ago. Two basses later, the quartet has elevated its scores more than 200 points since that start to its respectable 607 standing this past April.

Three Escapees—Lead Susan Schuman, Tenor Michelle Metallo and Baritone Georgette Chrystal—underscored this fact in a recent phone interview to offer encouragement to newer quartets. (Bass Janell Paviolitis, a past International Quartet Champion with Melo-Edge, couldn't talk for this article because she was visiting with her new grandchildren but sent some comments via e-mail.)

I asked the three to share the things they concentrate on individually to best amplify that unit ideal. Things the might benefit a lessexperienced quartet singer.

For Georgette, it's singing the baritone line like a melody and always remembering her relative position to the lead in a given chord. By the way, she focuses on tuning to the bass. Michelle urges tenors to "be assertive. Don't let them tell you you're the icing on the cake, because you're not. You're the cake." (She tunes to the baritone.) Via e-mail, Janell urges newer basses to have fun, sing with a smile in your eyes, sing to the ring in your voice and (yes) sing like a lead. And Susan says her job is all about accuracy, authority and emotion. "If the lead doesn't buy into it, no one will," she says.

Escape's primary coaches over the past year have included Jo Lund, Jeannie Froelich, Nancy Furhmann and Jim Arns. Certainly, winning



regional contest for the first time two years ago gave the quartet a new level of confidence, allowing them to try new things and tread on unfamiliar turf. It took a great deal of nerve, for example, for Susan to sing the lead feature "Scarlet Ribbons" for an audience that included the song's legendary arranger Renee Craig.

Speaking of performing, Escape emphasizes that all the coaching in the world can't simulate the lessons learned through live performance. Janell reminds the other three often that the yardstick of a quartet's true skill lies in the level of its worst performance—and that's the measure you need to improve. Upcoming opportunities for Escape to put that philosophy into practice include a July 22 gig for the Renaissance Group in Westfield, N.J., and an Aug. 23 date with the Bridgewater JCC.

"The only thing you can control is yourself," Susan says.
