Team Changes

As most of you know, Sweet Adelines International decided, on the recommendation of all the regions, to make a few changes in the composition of the Regional Management Team structure. Beginning with the May 2007 term, the Chapter Coordinator will be replaced with the Membership Coordinator title, and the current Membership/Marketing Coordinator position will become Marketing Coordinator.

In our forward-thinking region this has been the case since last year. I have been taking care of membership issues, which I absolutely love, since my term started in May 2006.

Everything we do at regular rehearsals has an impact on whether or not visitors decide to stay and become members. Is the director well-prepared? Are the members friendly and welcoming? Is the atmosphere positive and uplifting? Is there a musical plan for the upcoming year? Does everyone know the plan? Is there an emphasis on improving singing skills for each individual member? Does the director participate in educational events to get better?

I could go on and on, and will in the near future contact you all regarding more specific ideas and plans I would love to share with you, so we all can become a success.



Copyright and You

Copyright is a body of laws created by Congress and defined by the Constitution "to promote the progress of science and the useful arts, by securing for authors the exclusive right to their respective writings." The first federal copyright statute in 1790 gave protection to authors of books, maps and charts. In the 19th and 20th centuries, other statutes were enacted to expand the scope of protection to creative works including photographs, fine art, dramatic works and music.

Copyright owners have five basic rights:

1) The right to reproduce the copyrighted work in copies or phonorecords (that would be copying PRINTED MUSIC and making LEARNING TAPES).

2) The right to perform copyrighted work publicly. Strictly speaking, buying the music doesn't give us performance rights. That's why we need mechanical licenses for our shows and recordings.

3) The right to prepare derivative works based on copyrighted music. That means ARRANGEMENTS. This is why all arrangements must be "cleared" by either the arranger or International.

4) The right of public distribution of a copy-righted work.

5) The right to display a copyrighted work publicly. This is more appropriate for visual artists.

How Long Does It Last?

If published before 1923, the music is considered public domain and not bound by the above rights. If music was published between 1923 and 1963, the copyright term is 28 years, renewable for an additional 67 years (or 95 years total, so assume renewal); between 1964 and 1977, the term is 28 years PLUS AUTOMATIC RENEWAL for 67 years (or 95 years total); after 1977, the term is the composer's life PLUS 70 years.

What Does All This Mean?

In a word, it means that unless you have permission, DON'T COPY. If you are not sure, DON'T COPY.

International Headquarters has done a wonderful job of getting our organization to be legal in the last decade or so. The fee you pay to International for "X" number of copies of a song goes not to Sweet Adelines but to the copyright holder.

If your chorus purchased a song directly from an arranger, that arranger should have charged you a per-copy fee in addition to her arranging fee (it might have been hidden in the fee). THAT IS THE AMOUNT THE OWNER HAS DETERMINED IS FAIR COMPEN-SATION TO PERMIT THE SONG'S USE BY SWEET ADELINES. Therefore, when you are down to two copies and you have five new chorus members, you MUST contact Sweet Adelines or the arranger and BUY additional copies you need. This is the reason you are asked NOT TO COPY REGIONAL OR TRAX MUSIC TO SHARE WITH OTHER MEMBERS. The region purchases a certain number (paid through event registration), and we are liable for duplication. We cannot claim "we didn't know," even if we didn't!

Please be aware that Learning Tapes are also the exclusive right of the copyright holder. If you are purchasing them, be sure the supplier has the permission of the copyright owner. Although there are certain "fair use" exemptions to copyright, they are very stringent indeed and "non-profit" status is not an excuse for violating them.
