Celebrating A Barbershop Legend

Editor's Note: Last December, Master Director and International Quartet Champion Lead Renee Craig (The Cracker Jills, 1957) retired after 43 years of leading Region 15's three-time International Champion Ramapo Valley Chorus. Taglines asked Ramapo Valley member and Just4(kicks) Lead Jean Schoenlank to reflect on Renee's accomplishments.

How can we possibly sum up all the Renee Craig has meant to Sweet Adelines?

She has accomplished so much and has had such a tremendous impact on our organization. She's been a performer, director, arranger, composer, judge, teacher, coach, mentor and friend. She has been a pioneer and a formidable presence in Sweet Adelines International for more than 50 years. No one in the organization is her equal.

Fittingly, this year is the 50th anniversary of The Cracker Jills' 1957 quartet championship. The Cracker Jills gave Renee the opportunity to share her vocal talent with the barbershop world, as well as her incredible arranging ability and her unique performing style.

The 20 years she spent traveling and performing around the country with the Cracker Jills were her training ground. The Jills only sang Renee's arrangements. The other three members of the quartet—Jan Saundry, Judy Rowell, and Bobbi Bostick—never knew what to expect from Renee during a performance. Sometimes they'd barely have time enough to hear the pitch before she launched into a song, but the audience never knew what was and wasn't rehearsed. The Jills were crowd favorites everywhere they went—as popular as the men's quartets of the time, which was really saying something. The Cracker Jills were as close to professionals as amateurs could be.

In 1964, Renee moved to New Jersey from Michigan. She was lured here by Judy Rowell, who convinced her to become director of a new chorus formed from the merger of two existing choruses: the Ramapo Chapter and the Valley Chapter. Thus, Ramapo Valley was born.

From the first moments, Renee and Ramapo (continued next page)

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were synonymous. Renee grew as an arranger. She challenged the chorus members to sing arrangements that were beyond what they had ever sung before. She created incredible moments for chorus members and audience members. No one could arrange or direct a ballad like Renee.

Those who've been lucky enough to stand on the risers for her know how blessed they've been to sing for her and sing her music. Think of songs like "If I Loved You," "What I Did For Love," "Music Maestro Please," and "Maria." If you've heard Renee's arrangements, you'll never forget them.

Renee just sees and hears music differently from everybody else. It's genius.

Renee made the word "Champions" part of the Ramapo Valley name. In its 43-year history, Renee led the chorus to 18 Regional Championships and three International Championships. Competition was a way of life for Ramapo Valley. Once Sweet Adelines International decided to create the performance package in the international chorus finals, Renee was in her element. Her first creation of the "West Side Story" material rocked the Sweet Adelines world and won the chorus their second international championship. Her creativity was at its best in the performance packages the chorus performed over the years. She loved it and so did the chorus members.

In 1998, Sweet Adelines International chose to recognize Renee as the first ever recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award at the International Convention in Nashville. Once again, Renee made history.

And now, even though Renee has officially retired as director of Ramapo Valley, she will remain a force throughout the organization. Her music and arrangements will continue to be sung. Her influence will continue on those whose lives she's touched. Directors and performers throughout the organization will always strive to achieve the magic that Renee practiced so naturally.

In the end there's only one word that can truly sum up Renee—legend.

Calling All Team Leaders

Members holding the position of Team Coordinator/ President are responsible for facilitating chapter meetings. It is important to review the rules for the meeting before beginning—including the "one person speaks at a time" axiom. Team Coordinators and Presidents must keep meetings on task so that the momentum of the meeting will not be interrupted.

Another responsibility that the Team Coordinator/President must take on, after asking team members for discussion ideas, is getting an agenda out to the team before the meeting.

Team Coordinators/Presidents are also the Standing Rules expert on the team. These rules should be updated every three to five years. Currently, amended rules should be sent to my assistant as Team Coordinator, Johanna Herudek.

Every successful team has a long-range plan. The Team Coordinator/President has the responsibility to encourage her team to review the plan annually for revisions. The RMT's strategic plan is on the Region 15 Web site for your reference.

Finally, the Team Coordinator/President must lead the team to a successful solution to any problem that might arise, using either consensus or a vote. It is important again to enforce the "one person speaking at a time" rule. Patience and understanding will set the tone for your team so a desirable outcome is reached.

If you hold the Team Coordinator or President position, please keep June 3 free on your calendar so you will be able to attend a Leadership Workshop with your director. It will be a worthwhile experience to see that both you and your director are using a similar approach as the leaders of your chorus.

Every Individual Counts

As we approach competition, I want to remind everyone of how much we learn every day. I think that we don't always think in those terms on a regular basis.

We may think we learn only when put in a setting designed for education, such as a class, seminar or the like. Certainly the focus of what we are learning during the Sweet Adelines contest season is based on our music and all the components, which we assimilate during our rehearsals and coaching sessions. But I encourage and challenge each of you to broaden that thinking and open your minds and hearts.

Essential to our progress as singers is to gain complete understanding of the fundamentals, as well as the new skills we learn at our weekly rehearsals and coaching sessions. Additionally, we want to utilize the skills every time we sing and perform and be sure we are as consistent as possible. Another key component is to be aware of where we are in the process, as each member of our team is reliant on our consistency and growth. In this way, we can feel the consistency of not just ourselves as individuals, but of the performing unit—and that will certainly move us in the right direction.

If we are truly diligent in self-assessing and evaluating, then we can make real progress ongoing. It is then that we can be truthful in the realization of what we know we already know and what we know we must revisit. Further to that, other lessons become more apparent when we are comfortable with this process.

I want to emphasize the power of the "Team" not only in education, but in everything we do. When our focal point is the Team, so much seems to fall into place. What we do becomes so much more than our singing. Investing in your Team will teach you great lessons, bringing you exactly where you want to be.

Be open to these lessons and see them for what they are. Sometimes it is simply the right time to learn, whether it be something technical or something about ourselves or others. Never underestimate what we can achieve. Allow yourself the ability to do more and be more than you ever thought possible. Understand and allow the process to work for you. Remember that it is as important to learn from and with each other every day, as it is to learn at planned sessions. When everyone is of the same mind, great things begin to happen. When they happen together, anything is possible!

Where Should We Go Next?

As Events Coordinator, I work on finding sites for regional events, which include our Regional Convention, TRAX, Director's Workshops, RMT meetings and other special events scheduled by the region.

Since taking over the position last May, one of the main tasks I've been working on is looking at potential future convention sites.

Our Regional Convention site for the past few decades has been the Wyndham Franklin Plaza in Philadelphia. In June 2006, the hotel changed hands and is now called the Sheraton City Center. We are contracted to go to the Sheraton in 2007 and 2008. In November, Jeannie Allen, Cathy Bucholtz and I visited the remodeled hotel to see what changes they have made. They are very busy: new carpets, paint, wallpaper and the

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infamous Sheraton Sleep Beds are being tackled floorby-floor. The conference rooms are staying the same, but some have been renamed. When we visited, they were in the process of adding a concierge floor, and one of the Presidential Suites we traditionally contract is being remodeled into a lounge on the concierge floor. We're negotiating alternate space in lieu of that suite.

We also made two scouting trips, one to the Meadowlands Area of New Jersey and another to the Friar Tuck Inn in Catskill, N.Y. So far, however, we have not found a hotel with enough conference room space to meet our needs for competition.

If anyone can suggest a site within Region 15's borders that has a minimum of two large conference rooms; a minimum of two smaller conference rooms suitable for flat floor rehearsals and a primp room; and a minimum of 300 hotel rooms that cost no more than \$148/night) drop me an e-mail (schulcl@optonline.net). The RMT has approved a prize for the first person that recommends a site picked by the search committee.


